



Protected Plant Trigger Map


Step by step guide to find out what plant species may be present?

Queensland Government’s ‘Wildlife Online’ provides a free web-based search of endangered, vulnerable or near-threatened (EVNT) species within a specified radius of a central coordinate or within specified corners of an area of interest. Reports are available from <https://environment.ehp.qld.gov.au/report-request/species-list/>. This web search may provide a preliminary guide to protected plants previously noted from in or near the trigger area. A flora survey may still be required, depending on activity planned in the trigger area.

Coordinates must be in decimal degrees (example shown on the request form), you can determine these using either Queensland Globe or Google Earth or use an online conversion calculator.

1. Either select a central point or four boundary points from your blue ‘protected plant’ trigger area. If no coordinates are shown on your trigger map, overlay the map onto your regulated vegetation management map which should have coordinates along the map margin. Or view the trigger map in Qld Globe where coordinates are shown in the left corner, as the mouse pointer moves over the map. Location coordinates needs to be in decimal degrees. Use an online conversion calculator if you need to convert Degrees-Minutes Seconds into Decimal Degrees, or to convert UTM Easting/Northing into Decimal Degrees.

Australia is south of the Equator in the Southern Hemisphere. Therefore, latitude values will start with a “minus” sign (eg. – 15° 53’ 30” DMS, -15.8916 DD). There are 60 seconds in one minute and 60 minutes in one degree, so if you select a point half way in a map grid, it will be 30” sec or 30’ min.

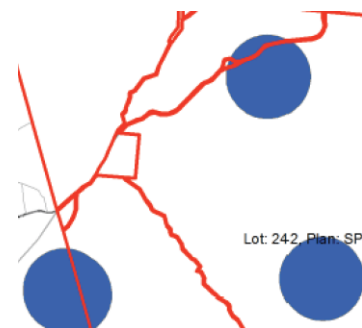
Conversion calculator - degrees, minutes, seconds to decimal degrees

For conversion of negative values enter Degrees Minutes Seconds in the format shown by this example: -35° 55' 56".

2. Go to **Wildlife Online – Request a species list** <https://environment.ehp.qld.gov.au/report-request/species-list/>.
- a. **Option A – Specified point report.** Insert the coordinates of a central point. The coordinates must be in decimal degrees and up to four decimal places. Select what size radius you require for the search area.
NOTE: Most protected plant trigger map dots have a 2km radius (which equates to the 4km wide blue dots).
OR
- b. **Option B – Defined area boundary report.** Select this option and insert the four boundary points of your area of interest.

3. Scroll down to Report Data and select

5. If request submission is successful, the protected plant report will be emailed to your email account. It will provide the scientific name of any protected plant and ENVT status. You can then search websites such as Australia’s Virtual Herbarium <https://avh.chah.org.au/> or Atlas of Living Australia https://biocache.ala.org.au/search#tab_simpleSearch to possibly find images and more information about the distribution and ecology of the native plant species.

Frequently asked questions:

What if the Wildlife Online search doesn't show any Endangered, Vulnerable or Near Threatened (EVNT) species? If there is a blue dot over the property but the Wildlife Online report does not have details of any EVNT species, it is possible that the record is confidential. To manage risks to certain species, not all records are publicly available through Wildlife Online.

Will a Wildlife Online search show all EVNT species? Whilst, in most cases, Wildlife Online will show you where EVNT species have previously been recorded, there may be other EVNT species present and a flora survey report is required to report all EVNT plants found during the survey within the clearing impact area. Note also that species classifications can and do change, so the species list generated from Wildlife Online for your property may change overtime.
